# 17 rumah atas tanah kerajaan diroboh

Penduduk Desa Subang Perantau dakwa diami lebih 20 tahun

**Shah Alam:** Tujuh belas rumah di Desa Subang Perantau, di sini, dirobohkan pihak berkuasa semalam, selepas Kerajaan Selangor memutuskan lot tanah mereka terbabit dalam projek melencongkan Sungai Pelempas.

Kerja merobohkan dua lagi rumah ditangguhkan sehingga 14 September ini apabila pemiliknya berjanji untuk mengosongkan kediaman.

Kerja meroboh 17 rumah bermula jam 7 pagi dengan kebanyakan penduduk mendakwa sudah mendiami kawasan itu sejak lebih 20 tahun lalu.

Pengerusi Jawatankuasa Bertindak Persatuan Penduduk Desa Subang Perantau, Basri Mustapha, berkata permohonan secara berkumpulan untuk 105 lot tanah di situ dibuat pada 1990.

Bagaimanapun, katanya hanya 16 lot belum diluluskan untuk Geran Kediaman Kekal.

"Pada Februari 2018, kerajaan

negeri mewartakan sempadan Sungai Pelempas sedangkan kami membina rumah kediaman lebih 10 tahun sebelum itu walaupun permohonan geran masih berstatus 'permohonan'.

"Penduduk fikir kerajaan negeri akan memberi kelulusan, namun tidak menyangka pula ia dirobohkan untuk melaksanakan projek berkenaan," katanya ketika ditemui di sini, semalam.

Basri berkata, penduduk yang kediamannya dirobohkan hanya diberi pampasan RM5.000 hingga RM15,000 yang disifatkan tidak memadai dengan kos yang sudah dikeluarkan untuk membina kediaman antara RM100,000 hingga RM300,000.

Katanya, penduduk turut mempersoalkan mengapa kerja melencongkan sungai itu membebaskan lot tanah mereka sedangkan ada tanah kosong di seberang sungai yang bersempadan dengan tanah milik Malaysia Airports Holding Berhad (MAHB) yang lebih sesuai.

"Sejak notis kerja meroboh di-

keluaran, kami banyak kali buat rayuan termasuk kepada Sultan Selangor dan Menteri Besar serta Kementerian Air, Tanah dan Sumber Asli, tetapi tidak berhasil.

"Jawatankuasa Bertindak Persatuan Penduduk Desa Subang Perantau turut berusaha menyelesaikan masalah itu, termasuk mengupayakan juruukur tanah dan membuat pelan cadangan lain untuk melencongkan sungai berkenaan, tetapi tidak diendah-

kan," katanya.

Basri berkata, selain pampasan tidak setimpal, penduduk yang terkesan juga tidak diberikan kediaman transit sementara.

Sebaliknya, beliau mendakwa mereka ditawarkan kediaman lain di projek Rumah Selangorku di Bandar Rimbau, namun kediaman itu akan siap dalam tempoh tiga tahun lagi.

"Jabatan Pengairan dan Saliran (JPS) Selangor dalam satu surat

jawapan kepada persatuan menyatakan projek berkenaan perlu dilaksanakan sebagai projek tebatan banjir di Kampung Melayu Subang.

"Kajian JPS dengan sebuah syarikat perunding kejuruteraan mendapati jajaran sungai itu semula jadi dan tidak boleh diubah kerana membabitkan struktur tanah di tebing sungai yang boleh membahayakan jika berlaku tanah runtuh," katanya.

# Selangor, YAKEB bantu bekas atlet

**Shah Alam:** Kerajaan Selangor memperuntukkan RM195,350 untuk membantu meringankan beban bekas atlet Selangor termasuk atlet orang kurang upaya (OKU) menerusi Program Ceria Atlet Selangor 2020.

EXCO Pembangunan Generasi Belia dan Sukan dan Pembangunan Insan Selangor, Mohd Khairuddin Othman berkata, program berkenaan dijalankan dengan kerjasama Yayasan Kebajikan Atlet Kebangsaan (YAKEB).

“Sebagai permulaan, kita akan membantu 50 bekas atlet negeri ini. Mereka akan diberi bantuan seperti membaikpulih kerosakan rumah dan pemberian sumbangan barang keperluan seperti perabot dan kelengkapan rumah.

“Setiap penerima mempunyai keperluan yang berbeza, justeru kita akan beri mengikut keperluan mereka dan penerima yang layak dalam kalangan bekas atlet yang dalam kesempitan serta tidak mempunyai pendapatan tetap,” katanya.

Beliau berkata demikian selepas Majlis Pelancaran Program Ceria Atlet Selangor 2020 di Bangunan

SUK Selangor, semalam. Turut hadir Pengerusi YAKEB, Datuk Noorul Ariffin Abdul Majeed.

Khairuddin berkata, sekurang-kurangnya 250 permohonan diterima YAKEB dan pemilihan dibuat berdasarkan penilaian oleh pejabat EXCO, Unit Perancang Ekonomi Negeri Selangor (UPEN) serta YAKEB dengan mengunjungi rumah bekas atlet.

Sementara itu, Noorul Ariffin merakamkan penghargaan kepada kerajaan negeri kerana membantu bekas atlet yang kebanyakannya mengalami kesusahan ketika ini.

“Tidak semua bekas atlet yang hidup senang selepas mereka bersara daripada arena sukan.

“Kita harap program ini boleh menjadi pemangkin kepada kerajaan negeri lain supaya kerajaan negeri lain boleh memperkenalkan program yang sama,” katanya.

Salah seorang penerima bantuan berkenaan adalah bekas juara silat dunia, Zakri Ibrahim.

# Selangor's pull factors draw the masses

Malaysia's Golden State offers plenty of economic opportunities and incentives for homebuyers

From the sacred shrines of the Gurdwara and the temples to the entertainment avenues of Sepang International Circuit (SIC) and Bukit Jalil, making the state the melting pot of every fragment of society with cultural, religious and spiritual diversity.

As the wealthiest and most progressive state in the country, it's hardly a surprise that Selangor's factors attract individuals and businesses looking for a slice of the Malaysian dream.

#### Land of opportunity

The state's gross domestic product (GDP) grew by 4.4% last year. Selangor's economy grew at the fastest pace of 6.7% among all the

other states and was followed by Kuala Lumpur coming in second at 6%.

From January to June 2019 alone, 10,000 foreign workers' permits were approved by the Malaysian Investment Development Authority (MIDA) in Selangor, contributing to a total value of RM5.1bil, RM2.1bil of which is from foreign investments.

The investment is a positive indicator of more foreign investment in Selangor. The properties in Selangor are in very high demand and with an excellent

asset appreciation rating, Real Estate & Housing Developers' Association (Rehdas) Selangor's chairman Datuk Ho Hon Sang said.

According to the National Property Information Centre's National Property Market Report, 2019 residential transaction in Selangor was around RM22.9bil, up 10.5% from RM20.8bil compared to 47,715 units valued at RM22.9bil in 2018.

The investment is a positive indicator of more foreign investment in Selangor. The properties in Selangor are in very high demand and with an excellent

multilingual. These are significant factors for business owners to set up shop and invest in the state.

#### Excellent infrastructure and connectivity

The state boasts some of the best medical facilities in the country with 173 institutions of higher learning institutions, proper communication networks, comprehensive transport systems, myth of integrated and inclusive townships that are unique to Selangor.

In fact, amongst the nation's best public infrastructure can be found in Selangor. It is the state that has the country's major airports, namely the Kuala Lumpur International Airport (KLIA) and the second largest airport in the country.

Coupled with the largest port in the country, Port Klang, Selangor is known as the primary port of entry for the nation's

economics.

The Klang Valley Integrated Transit System that runs through Selangor and Kuala Lumpur is an integrated network of rail and bus services.

The first elevated Bus Railway Transit (BRT)

was constructed to serve the light commercial area of Subang Jaya.

Following Light Rail Transit (LRT)

lines were extended and the newer Mass

Railway Transit (MRT) lines were built to connect the northern and southern

neighbourhoods within Selangor.

A fleet of private bus operators also serve the northern and southern areas in the Klang Valley.

Malacca became part of Selangor.

However, it was short lived as in 1880

Kuala Lumpur was named the capital

of Selangor. In 1971, Selangor became one

of the four states that have more

than one city with official city status.

The state has been

a key reason behind the success of



## Consumers up in arms over water disruption

**PETALING JAYA:** Dry taps greeted disappointed residents in seven Klang Valley districts following the shutdown of four water treatment plants due to odour pollution in Sungai Selangor.

Marketing executive Rachel Lee, 25, said the unexpected water disconnection was a huge inconvenience for her household of four, especially amid the coronavirus pandemic.

"We are trying to eat in and stay at home more because of the pandemic but depending on how long the water cut lasts this time, we now have to do takeaways or dine out," said Lee, who resides in Setapak.

She is concerned that with the water cuts affecting so many areas, there is a possibility that some eateries they usually buy food from would resort to reusing water.

"It feels like we are facing a never-ending cycle of water cuts. It is a disruption to our daily lives and routine," said Lee.

Housewife Analina Tajuddin, 32, who is currently undergoing confinement at home after giving birth to her first child two weeks ago, is deeply disappointed with the sudden disruption.

"How am I supposed to give my baby a bath? Am I supposed to use rainwater?

"I didn't store any water at home and we also have no idea when the supply will be back to normal," she said.

"We always hear of odour pollution being detected in our rivers, disrupting water sup-

ply to consumers.

"How come the authorities didn't take sterner action to deter criminals from committing such offences?" added the Gombak resident.

In a statement earlier, Air Selangor said 1,292 areas in Kuala Lumpur, Petaling, Klang, Shah Alam, Kuala Selangor, Hulu Selangor, Gombak and Kuala Langat were affected by the unscheduled water cuts yesterday.

Odour pollution detected in the raw water source for Sungai Selangor had caused the Sungai Selangor Water Treatment Plants Phase 1, 2 and 3 and the Rantau Panjang Water Treatment Plant to be shut down.

Lembaga Urus Air Selangor (Luas) later said that an unidentified solvent is believed to be the source of the odour.

Air Selangor said investigations were underway with several agencies, including Luas, to determine the nature and source of the pollution.

"Odour sampling is being conducted near suspected industrial premises near Sungai Gong, which is believed to have released the odour that smells like a solvent," it said in a statement.

Sungai Gong is a tributary of Sungai Sembah, which is the main tributary of Sungai Selangor located about 17km from the Rantau Panjang Water Treatment Plant.

Air Selangor said Luas had begun pumping 400 million litres of water from the Bestari Jaya pond and 500 million litres from the Sungai Tinggi Dam while opening the Bestari Jaya river gate to help overcome the odour.

Association of Water and Energy Research Malaysia president S. Pirapakaran said it was time that polluters were treated in the same category as terrorists for they were endangering the lives of many citizens.

He said as the water cuts were occurring during the pandemic when it was highly needed for hygienic purposes, people were at risk.

"We are still in the recovery movement control order and with the water cuts affecting so many areas, how are we going to maintain cleanliness at restaurants and workplaces for example?

"We don't want a water crisis cluster so it is

high time to up the stakes and treat the polluters as the same category as terrorists," he said.

He said existing laws should be amended to give consumers the power to recover losses incurred by unexpected water supply disruptions as offenders did not seem to be deterred by the current penalties.

Malaysian Water Forum president Saral James Maniam said hefty fines and jail sentence should be imposed on the polluters and information such as the company's name and its chief executive officer should be published in local newspapers.

She pointed out that odour pollution at raw water sources had been happening often, with previous occurrences in December 2019, in March and April this year and now again in September.

"We strongly believe that the National Water Services Commission (SPAN) should conduct studies on activities along the rivers to identify the causes of such incidents and elect Young Water Warriors to work with the authorities to be in charge of parts of the rivers.

"These Young Water Warriors from the communities living along the rivers should be rewarded for every case highlighted to the authorities," said Saral.

She added that responsibilities among different authorities should also be shared to carry out water pollution prevention and treatment activities efficiently.

# The richest state

Population growth, recovering property market and industrial potential point towards prosperity

The inflow of people to a particular location often indicate the presence of wealth, inflow of the population from other regions of Malaysia into Selangor is testimony towards the state's inherent potential to become a major hub of growth in population for the foreseeable future.

With a land area of 7,942km<sup>2</sup>, Selangor currently registers a population of 6.5 million, which is equivalent to around 20% of the total population of Malaysia at 32.2mil. This population is rising year on year, according to statistics, with an increase in 0.03% from 2018 alone, and a 1.0% increase compared to 2010 to 2018.

#### Defining wealth

According to Maybank Research Head Yeoh Kim Leng, another indication of a rich state is a higher per capita income, which is reflected in a higher purchasing power for its citizens, better standard of living and more advanced economic development. Selangor is more advanced than states with lower per capita income.

Selangor is the second wealthiest state with a per capita income of RM46,590 in comparison to the national average of RM35,243 in 2019, as published by the Malaysian Department of Statistics.

However, in terms of size, Selangor is the largest contributor to the country's gross domestic product (GDP), accounting for 23.7%, outstripping Johor at second place (15.3%) and Kuala Lumpur (10%).

Yeoh said Selangor also registers the highest number of millionaires and M&B households, with 37.1m for the

Besides looking at the income level and GNP, Yeoh noted other contributing factors such as natural environment, accessibility to infrastructure and capital stock such as building structures, utilities, physical and digital infrastructures, machinery, transport and equipment.

#### At a strategic confluence

Locally-wide, Selangor is a leading producer in the automotive, logistics business

Centre, Putrajaya Administrative Capital and the southern gateway to the IT Capital of Malaysia. Besides possessing 12 major airports (KLIA and KLIA2), Selangor is also home to the deepest port in the world, namely Port Klang.

Yeoh cited the well-developed road, rail and air connectivity, and a sophisticated business ecosystem as among the reasons for Selangor's success.

The large pool of skilled manpower number at 3.6mil, which is further supported by the fact that there are 60,000 graduates per annum, and a total of 171 institutions of higher learning in the state, are also key to invest Selangor. UiTM among them, are the well-established

supporting industries and supply chains, making Selangor among the leading states to attract foreign investors.

#### Growing industrial capabilities

Knight Frank Malaysia executive director (Capital Markets) Alisan Sim pointed out how Selangor has a strong industrial development, which are facilitated by the anticipated completion of the North-South Coast Expressway by the end of 2022.

The 253km long WCE will connect from



"Other broader measures of wealth include education, health resources, human capital, scientific knowledge and technological base," said Yeoh.

Taiping, Perak to Batu Gasing as a parallel access to the North-South Expressway, which will facilitate all the east-west bound highways running through Selangor.

The infrastructure has helped boost economic developments and will be a major factor in driving growth and opening up opportunities for new areas such as Kajang, Banting, Bandar Bulak Rajang, and Seremban, which is a strong platform, one that caters to the requirements of the industry, especially for the logistics segment and supply chain management.

To attract high-end advanced manufacturing in semiconductors,



medical devices, robotics and industries during Industrial Revolution 4.0. Yeoh suggested that the government should make the industrial parks to meet the stringent requirements of these high technology companies.

It could also provide additional support for the industry to attract skilled workers, the unavailability of which is frequently cited as a major disadvantage to foreign investors in the region over the years.

Yeoh said the proposed Selangor Investment Under policy package could aim to attract the developer of industrial parks, research and development, and innovation centres as well as the creation of hubs for the provision of high-value services.



#### Residential market recovering

The Covid-19 outbreak and subsequent lockdown in March placed a dampener on the real estate market in Selangor. The effects of the movement control order (MCO) mostly affected the residential market, as most buyers and tenants need to view the properties before committing to the transaction.

However, the MIEA president of Estates and MIEA president-elect Chan Ai Cheng said feedback from real estate agents and negotiators suggested that the sub-sale and rental market were back to pre-MCO levels.

With the price of a high-end condominium unit in Petaling Jaya, previously considered too expensive "further out", she said. Additionally, houses further from the city are priced at a much lower price point. Hence, new homeowners are more willing to move away from the city centre given better public infrastructure.

Besides, most developers are going back to the local market to sell their properties to cater to the local demand. Some of the major up-coming township developments include the One Utama in Semenyih, Gamuda Cove in the Southern Suburbs, and the new integrated project in Bandar Puchong Jaya.

Another exciting development is a mixed-use development in Cyberjaya, a megaproject developed by the Selangor State Development Corporation (PNSD) and Raudhatul Ihsan Sdn Bhd. It will be Malaysia's first green city, with its own airport, complemented by educational halls, libraries and computer centres. □

**T**HREE unscheduled water cuts that affected seven major districts in Kuala Lumpur involving thousands of households were caused by negligence on the part of the water utility company due to their reserves from being polluted.

# EFFLUENTS LIKELY CAUSE OF RIVER POLLUTION

Water authorities suspect Sg Gong industrial premises may have released effluents into Sg Selangor

**E**FFLUENTS with solvent-like odour from the Sungai Gong industrial area are suspected to be the cause of the Sungai Selangor pollution.

The Selangor Water Management Authority (Luas) said investigations, conducted with Pengurusan Air Selangor and other agencies, were ongoing.

"Odour sampling is being done around Sungai Gong, because we suspect industrial premises there may have released effluents with solvent-like odour into the river."

"We have activated the Bestari Jaya Pond Water Pumping Operations (OPAK) up to 400 million litres/day (JLH) to increase the dilution factor and released water from Sungai Tinggi Dam to 500 JLH to flush and accelerate the water flow down stream."

"Luas, Air Selangor and agencies involved are struggling to in-

vestigate and mitigate the problem." The water authority said it received a report that the Rantau Panjang water treatment plant had suspended operations.

Pengurusan Air Selangor Sdn Bhd (Air Selangor) said it was unable to produce 2,700 million litres of treated water daily for consumers in 1,292 areas.

It said up to 6.30pm, there were still traces of pollutants at the treatment plants.

The barometers showed that the odour pollution was at the 3 TON (threshold odour number) level.

"It will also take time for the disruption to end because the four treatment plants have been shut down for over 10 hours." Additional reporting by Deshegaan Bala Krishna

# Water cuts in Klang Valley since December

### **1. Dec 21 to 25, 2019**

The Sungai Semenyih Water Treatment Plan is shut down due to odour pollution.

The unscheduled water disruption hits 328,957 consumers in Petaling, Hulu Langat, Kuala Langat and Sepang.

A river monitoring team made up of personnel from Air Selangor and the Selangor Water Management Authority (Luas) is mobilised to identify the source of the odour contamination in the river as well as its tributaries.

Air Selangor activates the Emergency Action Plan to help customers.

Water supply is restored between Dec 23 and 25, with the recovery period varying from one area to another, depending on the location and altitude.

Water tankers are sent to affected areas.

### **2. March 17 and 18, 2020**

Water supply is halted at phases 1, 2 and 3 of the Sungai Selangor Water Treatment Plant and Rantau Panjang.

The districts affected are Kuala Lumpur, Petaling Jaya, Klang/Shah Alam, Kuala Selangor, Hulu Selangor, Gombak and Kuala Langat.

Water supply is restored in Kuala Selangor on March 18.

Operations are halted due to odour pollution in Sungai Selangor.

### **3. Scheduled water supply disruption [July 14 to 17]**

The four-day Sungai Selangor Treatment Plant (LRA) Phase 3 (LRA SSP3) upgrading work from July 14 causes a water supply disruption, affecting 420,000 users in Petaling, Klang, Gombak, Kuala Langat and Kuala Lumpur districts.

The shutdown, which includes the replacement of pipelines, is to improve the system and plant operation's efficiency.

The timing of the disruption and recovery of water supply vary by districts, locations, and alti-

tude of customers' premises.

Air Selangor mobilises 91 water tankers with priority given to critical premises, such as hospitals and dialysis centres.

Public water taps are provided by Air Selangor.

### **4. July 15, 2020**

A scheduled water disruption affects 26 areas, or nine per cent of total areas, from July 14 to 17.

Water is fully restored at 4pm on July 15.

Air Selangor mobilises 93 water tanker trucks to critical premises, such as hospitals, dialysis centres and health clinics.

Static tanks are placed at dialysis centres, health clinics and schools.

Water tankers are sent to residential areas on July 16.

On July 15, Air Selangor reactivates the SSP3 LRA system after the upgrading works at the plant.

### **5. July 21, 2020**

A water pipe bursts around 4pm in Jalan Johan Setia and Jalan Langat, Klang, on July 20.

This causes water disruptions in Klang (Bandar Bistari, Batu 5 and 6, Sijangkang and Jalan Johan Setia) and Kuala Langat (Sijangkang, Kampung Medan, Jalan Sijangkang Utama, Eco Sanctuary, Batu 9 Kebun Baru, Taman Perwira, Taman Seri Medan, Taman Sijangkang Jaya and Tropicana Aman).

The burst pipe is attributed to boring works for the construction of the Light Rail Transit 3 project.

Air Selangor water tankers are mobilised.

### **6. Sept 3, 2020**

Syarikat Pengurusan Air Selangor (Air Selangor) stops operations at the Rantau Panjang Water Treatment Plant at 7.15am, causing water disruptions in Kuala Lumpur, Petaling, Klang/Shah Alam, Kuala Selangor, Hulu Selangor, Gombak and Kuala Langat.
